

Frithstool

"Frithstool, Fridstool,
Freedstoll, Ang. Sax. Peace+seat:
literally seat of peace. A seat or chair
placed near to the altar in some
churches, a last refuge and most
sacred refuge of those who had the
privilege of sanctuary within them,
and for the violation of which the
severest punishment was decreed;
they were frequently, if not always,
of stone."

These stone benches are sometimes misidentified as bishop's thrones. (Distinct from the folding faldstool used by Roman bishops when not occupying the throne.)
