Pulpitium

Much like the wooden rood screen the pulpitium was designed to separate the choir from the nave. It was usually of stone and several feet thick. At one time all large cathedral priories had both a pulpitium and a rood screen. Pulpitia sometimes served as platforms for choirs and in much later times they could be made to accommodate an organ
